Lipper rankings for class Y shares are based on total return without sales charge relative to all share classes of funds with similar objectives as determined by Lipper.

The Morningstar Rating™ for funds, or “star rating,” is calculated for managed products (including mutual funds, variable annuity and variable life subaccounts, exchange-traded funds, closed-end funds, and separate accounts) with at least a three-year history. Exchange-traded funds and open-ended mutual funds are considered a single population for comparative purposes. It is calculated based on a Morningstar Risk-Adjusted Return measure that accounts for variation in a managed product's monthly excess performance, placing more emphasis on downward variations and rewarding consistent performance. The top 10% of products in each product category receive 5 stars, the next 22.5% receive 4 stars, the next 35% receive 3 stars, the next 22.5% receive 2 stars, and the bottom 10% receive 1 star. The Overall Morningstar Rating for a managed product is derived from a weighted average of the performance figures associated with its three-, five-, and 10-year (if applicable) Morningstar Rating metrics. The weights are: 100% three-year rating for 36-59 months of total returns, 60% five-year rating/40% three-year rating for 60-119 months of total returns, and 50% 10-year rating/30% five-year rating/20% three-year rating for 120 or more months of total returns. While the 10-year overall star rating formula seems to give the most weight to the 10-year period, the most recent three-year period actually has the greatest impact because it is included in all three rating periods.

Putnam Dynamic Asset Allocation Conservative Fund received 3, 3, and 4 stars for the 3-, 5-, and 10-year periods among 514, 450, and 285 Allocation — 30% to 50% Equity funds, respectively. Putnam Dynamic Asset Allocation Balanced Fund received 3, 3, and 4 stars for the 3-, 5-, and 10-year periods among 638, 581, and 414 Allocation — 50% to 70% Equity funds, respectively. Putnam Dynamic Asset Allocation Growth Fund received 3, 3, and 4 stars for the 3-, 5-, and 10-year periods among 310, 279, and 190 Allocation — 70% to 85% Equity funds, respectively.
